Working our way through Kings (main service and Sunday School) has been encouraging. Our pre-school Sunday School has grown to around 12 children- a fair portion of the congregation goes out for the first part of the service! Several of the mums at church are involved with a MOPS group run through Manurewa Bible Chapel- MOPS is a ministry for Mothers Of PreschoolerS, and it is great to be able to join them for their fortnightly sessions. We also recently hosted a Catalyst (TSCF) workshop for undergraduate students and will be taking part in the Annual National TSCF Catalyst Conference soon.

The 16th Hamilton Easter Convention with Rev. Simon Manchester, from St Thomas Anglican Church in North Sydney, was well attended. The messages were very thoughtful and encouraging. In a departure from previous practice, the introduction of one biographical message proved very popular. Simon introduced many of us to the Rev. Charles Simeon, whose faithful ministry in Cambridge in the face of unbelievable opposition produced a host of evangelical Anglican ministers committed to systematic Biblical exposition. This year Gracebooks, from Hawkes Bay, came up to the Convention for the first time. This allowed attendees to purchase a range of books not seen at the Convention previously. As part of our morning programme over June, July and August we are viewing a DVD series entitled The History of Christianity presented by Dr Timothy George, Dean of Beeson Divinity School at Stamford University in the United States.

A number of our folk have been thorough the CAP Money Programme, a budgeting system which helps people to gain control of their finances. One of our members, Greg Kitt, has undertaken training so as to be able to teach the programme. We see this as another way in which the church can reach out into the community at a pint of need.

We are currently preaching through the Book of Ephesians and The Parables during morning services and the Book of Daniel during the afternoon services.
